FROM THE LAY LEADER

I spent some of my sabbatical at the Franciscan Friary in Alnmouth. It sits on a green hill overlooking a long, beautiful beach. I was walking there one afternoon and came across a group of coastguards standing around a dead minke whale. It was about fifteen feet long and with no visible signs of injury or disease.

It was a sad scene but it gave me an opportunity to look closely at the whale. It had a sturdy barrel-like body, with delicate, elegant flukes. Its underside was a brilliant white, and its back an intense glossy black. Most striking was its baleen, the thick net of bristles which in baleen whales grow down from the upper jaw in the place of teeth. They use it to filter krill and small fish from the sea. (Baleen whales evolved from toothed whales about 30 million years ago.)

Increasing numbers of minke whales are being washed up on the east coast and no-one quite knows why. Looking at this magnificent alien animal I gave thanks for the natural world, and for the science that helps us understand it. Let us treasure it, let us truly know its sacred worth and strive to be its wise stewards.
