Welcome from Jef

Welcome to our newsletter for November.

The committee and I have been thinking about the time before services at our church, about the ten, fifteen minutes during which people arrive and settle for the start of the service. This used to be a time of quietness. There was no strict rule of silence but there was a habit of stillness. It was a moment in which people could settle into their time at church and begin to centre themselves. We think it would benefit our spiritual life as a church community to return to this habit of stillness before services. Our member Jo visited a church recently where ten minutes before the service the worship leader lit a candle with the words *I call for stillness*. We're going to start doing this - as soon as the Portico Repair Project is complete and the entrance to the church will once again be through the main doors. We hope you'll

appreciate this restoration of a time of stillness before services.

Also below you'll find two contributions that our Membership Secretary, Caroline Drijver, made to our service on October 7th celebrating our volunteers. From the Lay Leader

Why do you come to church?

I remember somebody asking me that question about 17 years ago. I had been coming to services at our church for about three months. It was an interesting question. I can't remember exactly how I answered but in hindsight I think I was looking for a different type of time and space in my life.

There were certainly lots of things about our church that I valued. I got a great deal from Rev Jane Barton's services. Her compassionate presence and her insight into the human condition always inspired me. Her sermons were full of writers and

thinkers I'd not come across. I enjoyed singing some of the hymns I remembered from school assembly. More than anything Jane and the congregation affirmed the spiritual life, and within it the value of stillness.

My first experience of the church had been the quiet reflection circle that Jane held once a month on a Sunday evening. In all kinds of ways I struggled with stillness in those days. I wasn't used to sitting still and my back would hurt! I would sit there feeling very self-conscious, waiting for the silence to end. Yet when it did I would often feel relieved but also sad that it had. Something kept drawing me back to our church and the stillness it provided. I remember saying that I felt magnetised, pulled towards something in a way that I could not explain. I know now how the human soul grows in stillness, struggles in it for sure, but is held, centred and nourished in it too. I think that's what was calling me.

Recently the committee and I have been discussing the time before services. We're conscious of just how busy and full our lives are today and how little quietness there is in the modern world. The moments before a service used to be a time when people would arrive and centre themselves. They would be still within themselves and allow the piano prelude to draw them into the service. We do from time to time have people asking if we could return to this and we think it would be good for our spiritual well-being if we could. Once we are able to enter the church through the main doors the service leader or one of our volunteers will light a candle ten minutes before the service and call for stillness in the church. We hope you will appreciate this return to a quiet time before the service starts.

Celebrating Volunteers

Our service on Oct 7th was a celebration of volunteering at our church. Our membership secretary Caroline Drijver made two contributions to this service which are below.

Part One

Like all churches, our church relies heavily on volunteers. It relies on the people who are volunteering now, and our very existence is due to those who have volunteered through the years.

First we should acknowledge that this church does not exist without its congregation, and in this way our primary commitment is to congregate.

There may be those of us in the congregation who will volunteer for something in the future, those of us who currently volunteer, those of us who have volunteered in the past and are resting, and those of us who contribute by attending.

So, it give an idea of the magnitude of the volunteering that occurs to support us in our spiritual journeys within this church, here is a list. Bear in mind too some things may be missing from this list. Hopefully not.

In no particular order.

Some of you may be familiar with the Goose Story by Harry Clarke Noyes which I think is apt.

Next fall,
when you see Geese
heading South for the Winter,
flying along in V formation,
you might consider
what science has discovered
as to why they fly that way:
As each bird flaps its wings,
it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.
By flying in V formation the whole flock adds at least
71% greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance

of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.

When the Head Goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Finally, and this is important, when a goose gets sick, or is wounded by gunshots and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection.

They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly, or until it dies.

Only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their group.

This church cannot function without your commitment, energy, sharing of yourself, your love.

May you be sustained

May you know the greatness of your contribution

May we all know the greatness of your contribution

And may you know when to rest, knowing the importance of simply congregating.

Part Two

A few years ago I was driving through a part of the Netherlands I was unfamiliar with. It was in the east, bordering Germany. The landscape was disturbing. Straight roads with dark boggy water as far as the eye could see, both sides of the road. There were dead silver birch trees leaning over, many of then with the tops snapped off, often with the snapped top dangling down. There was no green. Just the darkness of the water and the pale trees. Every now and then there were swans. This eerie scene went on for several miles, after which there were beautiful large green trees, lush fields, and an old redbrick factory. There was also an information board. I got out to read this. I had been driving through a peat restoration area. The sign proudly announced an EU funded project to restore these peatlands, saying that they would be fully restored by the year 3000. My heart felt powerfully uplifted that people today are laying the foundations for the earth and future generations in 1000 years time.

There was something of this in the fundraising events this year, and every year, for the repair and upkeep of this building. Everything we do now is not only for us now, but for future generations too.

And somewhere in Brighton, Britain, and the wider world there are people not yet known to us who will cross the threshold of this building, and these will form new congregations, each contributing as they are able. And like the volunteers of today,

they too may have family at home supporting them in this by enabling them to take time out to volunteer.

And for us now, a short story:

An elderly carpenter was ready to retire. She told her employer of her plans to leave the house building business and live a more leisurely life with friends and family. She would miss the income, but her body ached and she needed to retire.

The employer was sorry to see this good worker go and asked if she could build just one more house as a personal favour. The carpenter said yes. She liked her employer, and as it was a personal favour she and those working with her worked hard and made the house especially beautiful on outside and the inside.

When the carpenter finished her work and the employer came to inspect the house, the employer handed the front-door key to the carpenter. "This is your house," he said, "my gift to you."
