24th September - Frantisek Brikcius (Cello) & Christopher Langworthy (Piano) Cellist František Brikcius chose to dedicate his life to the interpretation of cello compositions written by composers of the 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, giving special consideration to compositions for solo cello. His favourites are cello suites by J. S. Bach, M. Reger and B. Britten. He is particularly involved in performing works by Czech, Jewish & Terezín and contemporary composers playing on a "George Kriwalski" cello made in 1904.

A small initial group have begun gathering information, seeking advice and

creating a draft job description and person specification. However, our request for volunteers from our membership to join the 'Search Party' brought few responses and we have sent out a further request via email asking for input from our members. This is not a journey the Committee could or should be doing alone. On that note, we will also be inviting all our congregation to join in a community conversation about our vision and priorities for the future and what we want we want from our new Minister/Lay Leader. We hope to be able to do this in a number of ways including by post and face to face in some form of group 'cafe' session after our Bicentennial (plus one) service on 24th October. This is a vital part of our shared responsibility to secure and grow our wonderful church and community through finding the right person for this important job.

### Brighton & Hove remembers lives and losses during the pandemic with 'A Day of Compassion'

On Sunday 17 October 2021 at 4pm in Brighton Dome Concert Hall, the Mayor of Brighton & Hove will oversee an inspirational service honouring the people of our city and the lives lost from the coronavirus pandemic. Entitled *A Service of Compassion*, the event will serve at the heart of a city-wide initiative – *A Day of* 

### Compassion.

A Day of Compassion is being run by Brighton & Hove's Interfaith Contact Group, which serves as Chaplain to the Mayor, and represents many of the faith groups, and none, in the city. Everyone is welcome to take part and share a moment of compassion on this special day.

A variety of music, uplifting messages, films, memories and recitations will be featured at the *Service of Compassion*. From 11am to 2pm, Brighton Dome's Foyer will also be open as *A Place for Reflection*, with stalls for visitors run by a selection of charities and services that have supported the city during these difficult times. In other parts of Brighton, healing support groups, workshops, exhibitions, music and meditation sessions will take place at venues including the Friends' Meeting House, Unitarian Church and Fabrica Gallery and Jubilee Library will be providing regular information and updates about the day.

Tickets are free for the *Service of Compassion* but must be booked in advance, via Brighton Dome's website or phone line from Wednesday 1 September. The event will be BSL Interpreted. *A Place for Reflection* is free and open to attend in the Foyer from 11am to 2pm, no booking required.
