CALL FOR THE 366th ANNIVERSARY MEETING - TAUNTON UNITARIAN CHAPEL

We have received this invitation from Daniel Costley, Secretary of the General Baptist Assembly, which has regularly given us a small grant to help pay for our Lay leader. If anyone would like to go please contact secretary@brightonunitarian.org.uk by the first week in April.

The General Baptist Assembly will be holding its Annual General Meeting at **Taunton Unitarian Chapel, Mary Street, Taunton, Somerset, TA1 3PE on Saturday 7th May 2022.** We will gather from 11.30, with a Service at 12pm, lunch at 1pm, and the AGM at 2pm, to finish by 3pm.

As agreed at the AGM last year, we are this year again moving the meeting to a member congregation, and will include a Service, the meeting, and a chance to for social gathering. Events in recent years at Sevenoaks, Godalming and Nottage have proved to be very popular and nourishing.

Given the distance involved for some delegates, balancing the needs of the Assembly's finances, and following discussion with congregations, we cannot necessarily cover the full costs of travel for delegates, but will pay up to the first £50. We cannot, as is normal, cover the costs of non-delegates, but we do encourage as many people from each congregation as possible to attend. For those travelling some distance, perhaps shared cars might be an option for travel.

An appeal by the Unitarian General Assembly

Saving Ukrainian lives now

We are seeing a terrifying tragedy unfold before our eyes. The people of Ukraine are facing the worst disaster and Europe as a whole our most dangerous political crisis since the Second World War.

Many children's lives are in immediate danger, 7,500,000 directly affected by this rapidly escalating conflict. Homes, schools and hospitals have been damaged or destroyed. Water, electricity and other essential facilities have been badly disrupted. Landmines and other devastating weapons are killing many innocent civilians.

Should not Unitarians and all people of goodwill feel morally impelled to act now to save lives?

Bombs are rained down on Ukrainian cities. Innocent civilians, including defenceless women, children and the elderly, are subjected to incessant shelling and are forced to take cover in basements and shelters. They endure days without water, food and other basic supplies.

By donating to the British Red Cross Ukraine Crisis Appeal you will help Ukrainian victims of war by:

supporting families with food, warm clothing, first aid and medicines; taking people to hospitals, transporting medical supplies and helping set up blood donation units; supporting and funding hospitals and primary healthcare facilities, fire fighters and civil protection units;

repairing homes, schools and community centres; and rebuilding or replacing Ukraine's vital infrastructure damaged or destroyed by war.
